Report 2004

This was a busy year presided over by a dedicated captain who managed to squeeze in 5 meetings climaxing with a 3 day trip to Chantilly for our fourth overseas Captain's Outing. Encouragingly, both attendances and the weather improved on previous years.

Total Paper Management kindly sponsored the Spring Meeting held at Chelmsford in May. Due to rebuilding works which had over-run we changed in a Portkabin causing much hilarity and a strong letter of complaint from your Secretary. He obviously had no complaints about the course as the short, undulating layout with fast greens eminently suited his game and he won the Jack Ryman Cup with 41 of the best and brightest. The attendance was 33 and it did not rain, just for a change.

The following month we revisited one of our favourites, Camberley Heath, and our sponsors were **Oyez Straker**. Again it stayed dry and Danny Ayriss won the John Bond Cup with 40 points.

The hectic pace continued in July when **Jet UK** sponsored our 'grand return' to Gerrards Cross where a bumper turn-out of 48 once again enjoyed the pleasures of this lovely course. Andrew Stacey resumed where he left off the previous year and took the President's Trophy with 41 points.

The special meeting in August at Sprowston Manor was supposed to be a match against the legal profession of East Anglia. We fielded a team of 20 but as there were only 2 opponents a singles Stableford was played instead. The weather was somewhat indifferent but there was a close contest with Brian Tolley winning on count-back with 34 points. As it turned out this was a very poignant occasion. Sadly, just four months later Brian became very ill while on a holiday cruise and died in hospital on his return to the UK. He was a 'character' and will be missed.

Our retiring captain has asked if he can donate a trophy dedicated to Brian's memory to be played for annually. I am sure we can all agree this is an excellent (and typically generous) gesture. All that remains is to devise a suitable and worthy achievement to commemorate this long serving and affectionately remembered member.

And so, five continuous months of golf culminated in our visit to the leafy, picturesque surroundings of Chantilly. We enjoyed warm, mainly sunny weather in gorgeous surroundings with the changing hues of the trees a treat to the eye.
